Symposium 'Sickness & Love'

The annual symposium of Medische Antropologie was held on 14th December 2007 at the University of Amsterdam. The title was 'Sickness & Love'. About thirty participants from The Netherlands, Belgium, Italy, Sweden, Portugal, Greece and South Africa discussed eleven papers, most of them works in progress. The discussion took place mainly from the viewpoints of anthropology, literary theory, and medicine. During the discussion two large themes emerged. One theme suggested that love itself is a kind of sickness, which deregulates human behaviour and causes psychological and social problems. Love may indeed have fatal consequences. Novels in particular present this dramatic picture of love as 'sickness', but also in the 'reality' of everyday life (romantic) love may be observed with suspicion, anxiety and condemnation. Papers about love in Nepal and South Africa described such conflict between emotion and culture/society. The second theme was an exploration of how and when sickness may engender (or disrupt) love. Papers dealt, among other things, with the care that is given to (or withheld from) people living with AIDS; and about a mother who tries to free herself from a suffocating love for an addicted child that threatens to destroy her.
